Ideas of Weaving and Prairie Perspectives Unravelled in The Thread of the Wish, Opening January 30th, at the Art Gallery of Regina

The Art Gallery of Regina invites everyone to discover how weaving becomes a method for interlacing cultures and sharing lived experience in its latest exhibition.

Regina, SK: The Art Gallery of Regina (2420 Elphinstone Street) presents *The Thread of the Wish*, an exhibition exploring unconventional approaches to weaving as storytelling. The show runs from January 30 to March 28, 2026; curated by the Art Gallery of Regina's own Sandee Moore, it features works by Negar Devine-Tajgardan, Adrian Golban, Lara Felsing, and David Garneau. Moore titled the exhibition after a passage from Sigmund Freud's 1908 essay on writers and creativity, "Past, present and future are strung together [...] by the thread of the wish that runs through them." The thread of desire that connects past and future includes the desire for a better world, suggests Moore.

The Thread of the Wish is notable for the artists' approach to weaving—not only as a craft, but as a metaphor for connection, storytelling, and the creation of social fabric. Each artist weaves together memory, cultural heritage, and relationships to nature in artworks spanning photography, painting, and sculpture. Textiles are often closely connected with our bodies, providing shelter, comfort, and warmth, while also telegraphing our identities through the woven designs that adorn bodies and living spaces. Fingers weave together strands, speaking of the intertwined nature of our lives and the labour of expressing an identity.

Devine-Tajgardan (Saskatoon) transforms a photograph of her murdered uncle, which was long kept hidden behind another photograph in a family album. She slices the image into strips or separates it into threads, which she then weaves into textiles with patterns inspired by her family's daily life in Iran. Through this intimate process, she forges a renewed connection with her uncle and reclaims Persian design, healing from the trauma of Iran's oppressive regime.

Golban's (Saskatoon) constructions draw on memories of Romanian weaving traditions. *For Knotted Vestiges (Vestigii Inodate)*, the artist built a replica Neolithic loom, like one he remembers his grandmother using, from salvaged branches to support a tapestry of clay squares. Devoid of the soft comfort of a traditional textile, the tapestry, which incorporates pieces of ceramic self-portraits, embodies Golban's notion that "we in our lives will be fragmented by daily life and trauma."

Felsing's (Edson, AB) practice exists in close relationship to the land of Northern Alberta and Métis traditions passed down through generations. An array of foraged, found, and repurposed materials in the artists' blankets and baskets captures the complex story of her local landscape, shaped by climate extremes, natural cycles, and human impact.

Garneau (Regina) depicts the woven-arrow sash, a key symbol of Métis identity, in bold slashes of paint, distilling its rich symbolism and flattening it into a text. In his allegorical paintings, he transforms the sash and juxtaposes it with other objects, expanding the story woven into the interlaced wool threads. He depicts the sash looped into a noose, swaddling a length of charred wood, or with its tasseled ends knotted in a code-like arrangement, prompting reflection on the unique challenges of a hybrid identity—one that bridges past and present, and exists within both Indigenous and settler cultures.

The Thread of the Wish transforms our understanding of weaving and expectations of prairie life. The four prairie artists in the exhibition weave together strands of thought and lived experiences of newcomers and Indigenous peoples to create a strong social fabric.

The Art Gallery of Regina is committed to accessibility and inclusion—admission to all exhibitions, including *The Thread of the Wish*, is always free. Everyone is invited to the opening reception on Friday, January 30, from 5:00 to 8:00 PM to meet and celebrate the artists. Visitors can engage further through free resources such as exhibition audio tours sponsored by SaskTel and Indigenous Perspectives events sponsored by Casino Regina.


