Art made with the land

When you think about landscape art, what comes to mind?

Maybe you think of paintings or pictures on a computer. But did you know that sometimes artists don't make pictures?

One artist named Gladys Wozny-Siemens places wet plaster directly on dry soil from a riverbed to make sculptures showing us precisely what the land looks like. She doesn't just make the sculptures by herself, though. She lets animals and the weather also leave their marks on the soil. The sculptures are not just her art but also a collaboration with nature.

Are humans part of the landscape?

Do artists only show nature when they paint landscapes, or do they include things people make, like buildings, roads, and graffiti?

Some artists, like Catherine loa and Mike Keepness, have these things in their paintings. This helps us understand what people do in these places and what is important to them.

Keepness paints pictures of places where

water flows, and he is thankful for these special and important places; he also paints prayer cloths which are a way for people to speak directly to nature.

Joa thinks we can't separate people and their actions from the landscape.
